She was a noted American abolitionist, militia leader, cook, spy, nurse, Civil War scout, suffragist, political activist and visionary.

It is my hope that Harriet will inspire the Warrior within each of us. In our current climate of divisiveness and lack of moral grounding, we all could use her as a symbol of bravery in the face of overwhelming odds.
